Tour or Trek?

Tours are day tours (one to eight hours) and include walking tours and bus tours.

Treks are usually overnight trips or visit areas more than 75 miles from Denver.

Tour Difficulty Scale

- **Easy**- May include light physical activity, including boarding a bus, short periods of standing, walking, and some stairs.
- **Moderate**- Includes walking up to two miles on streets or easy trails, climbing stairs, or spending several hours outside.
- **Ambitious**- May involve several nights away from home, long stretches on a bus, and activity-filled days. Be prepared to walk up to two miles a day on easy to moderate terrain or spend long periods outside.
- **Challenging**- Requires a high level of fitness and an adventurous streak! May include day hikes over potentially rough terrain, accessing remote areas in a vehicle, by foot, or by boat, and/or extended periods outside.



“Night Skies of the Ancients: Mesa Verde” Overnight Trek

Trek = Challenging (Please reach out for specific details.)

Humans' infatuation and relationship with the cosmos transcends all time and space. Here in Colorado, the Ancestral Puebloans revered the cosmos. Their relationship with the celestial bodies and the Earth cannot be understated. They studied and understood in great detail annual cycles, the cycles of the celestial bodies, and the major and minor lunar standstills. These cosmic cycles were marked not just with archeo-astronomical markers; they were incorporated in the layout and placement of buildings and kivas, and they were recorded in countless pictographs and petroglyphs. From Chimney Rock to Mesa Verde, the Ancestral Puebloans thrived in Southern Colorado, where one thousand years ago, 30,000 people lived, about three times as many as do today. In this trek, we will explore this wondrous and advanced ancient world. Staying inside Mesa Verde at the Far View Lodge, we will be in the heart of the land that Ancestral Puebloans called home. Although we are greatly separated in time, we will behold the same night sky as they did. Perhaps we humans are all more connected than we realize.

Day One

We begin this adventure at History Colorado early on the first day. It takes 7 hours of driving to reach Mesa Verde National Park, but do not fret! Our deluxe motorcoach is equipped with a clean bathroom, window shades, and wifi. Plus, we will have TVs to view content Jack will detail, from maps to diagrams, photos, and more. Our educational journey begins the moment you step aboard. Our first jaunt will be to Salida, where you will be free to enjoy lunch on your own. Once we depart this charming historic railroad town, we will cross Poncha Pass, traverse through the San Luis Valley, go over Wolf Creek Pass, and travel alongside Chimney Rock, a natural and human archeoastronomy site. Our welcome dinner will be held in Durango this evening. We will have a nourishing meal before retiring to Mesa Verde Park itself at the Far View Lodge, where, from our hotel, there are points where you can see all four Four Corners States.

Day Two

Breakfast at your leisure starts our day at the Far View Terrace Cafe! Coffee, parfait, omelet, or whatever, there will be plenty of options to fill your stomach for a day of adventure. We start the day with an optional group tour around the park. From our motorcoach, we will visit some nearby and noteworthy archeological sites before we return for lunch. Lunch will also be at the Far View Terrace Cafe, which also houses the park's gift shop. Is that a good thing? Oh, most definitely. But it is important we return here, for it is the starting point of our private guided tour of Cliff Palace and the cliff dwellings of Mesa Verde. It is within Cliff Palace where the Ancestral

Puebloans kept their records of the major and minor lunar standstills, a cycle that occurs every 18.6 years. This will be quite the day for adventuring! And there will be no better way to end it than with our second group meal at the Metate Room Restaurant, with sweeping views of the park from your dinner table. But before you go to bed! We will have the opportunity to participate in the park's night sky viewing program, a ranger-led experience where we will stargaze upon the ancient sky. This will be at the nearby amphitheater within the park, a short bus ride away. Keep all flashlights at home! We will provide you with a red light flashlight for your safety and viewing pleasure, as these do not create light pollution. This experience is optional, so if you wish to go to bed early, you will have sweet dreams under the ancient stars. With full stomachs and minds filled with knowledge of the cosmos, the ancient stars shine above as we sleep.

Day Three

Breakfast will again be at the Far View Terrace Cafe, but from there, we will venture into the remaining areas of the park that we have yet to see! We will see spiral markers, pit houses, and ancient reservoirs that today are celebrated by modern engineers. And of course, many more cliff dwellings! We will not return to the hotel until after lunch, so lunch will be enjoyed at the Spruce Tree Cafe deep within Mesa Verde. Tonight, though, will be a little atypical. You have the option of coming with me to Hovenweep National Monument. This requires travel outside the park and a later night than our first night. If you choose to stay at the hotel, I recommend you dine at the bar and lounge, which offers a different menu and a terrace with unequivocal views of the Four Corners. Enjoy a splendid and relaxing final evening of our epic journey! For those who wish to go to Hovenweep, we will stop in Cortez for dinner on your own before heading into the park. We will watch the sunset from the trails and ruins of this amazing site before returning to the Visitor Center to watch the stars reveal themselves to us in all their splendor. Don't forget your red light flashlights! With this being our last night, we say goodbye to the ancient sky and the ruins of the ancients that called this site home.

Day Four

With all of our new knowledge, memories, and friends with us, it is time to return to Denver. It will be a full day of travel with one stop for lunch in Del Norte, CO. While our bus provides us the comfort needed to travel long distances, we will also make a very brief stop in Johnson's Village for a quick opportunity to stretch our legs, use the restroom, or do a little gift shopping. Afterwards, we cross Trout Creek Pass, Red Hill Pass, and Kenosha Pass before we are brought back into the Denver area. We have seen so much and made so many new memories and friends. It is our hope that you leave this trek with a new and vibrant appreciation for the cosmos and how they connect us all across time and space.

“Japanese-American Farming, Past and Present” Bus Tour

Even before World War II, Japanese Americans contributed to Colorado’s agricultural industry through their farms across the state. This bus tour will focus on some of the accomplishments of our Japanese-American neighbors through a tour of the past and a connection with farmers of the present. Gil Asakawa will lead us on a day bus tour in the Brighton area to engage with this essential part of Colorado history.

Our first stop will be Minoru Farms, owned by a 4th-generation daughter of immigrants, Jade Sato. Minoru Farms’ mission is to grow Asian vegetables to feed its local and diverse community. Before lunch, we’ll meet with Robert Sakata, son of Bob Sakata, to learn more about the 1986 recipient of Centennial Ranch and Farm status, Sakata Farms. Mr. Sakata will lead us on a tour and discuss his family’s impact on the past and present vegetable crop industry. Join us on this day of farm tours and exploring Colorado’s Japanese history!

Gil Asakawa is a cultural consultant, journalist, author and blogger who covers Japan, Japanese American and Asian American, Native Hawaiian and Pacific Islander (AAPI) culture and identity in blogs, articles and social media. He is a nationally-known speaker, panelist and expert on Japanese American and Asian American history and identity. He’s the author of “Being Japanese American” (Stone Bridge Press), a history of Japanese in America originally published in 2004 and revised in 2014, and co-author of “The Toy Book” (Alfred Knopf, 1991), a history of the toys of the Baby Boom generation. His latest book is “Tabemasho! Let’s Eat!” (Stone Bridge Press, 2022), a history of Japanese Food in America.

In 2023 he was awarded the Order of the Rising Sun, Gold and Silver Rays from the Japanese government for his longtime efforts to build bridges between Japan and the United States.

“Curiosities of Cripple Creek” Overnight Trek

Nothing could be more atypical than a town that has more than 2,600 miles of mining tunnels beneath it, and that once had a population of more than 50,000 people! Today, Cripple Creek is a charming mountain and gaming town home to 1,155 people, numerous casinos, and a very unique and special heritage railroad, the Cripple Creek and Victor Narrow Gauge! On this trek, History Colorado invites you to come and explore all that makes Cripple Creek special, curious, and wondrous! We will explore its unique rail history, ride the Cripple Creek and Victor Narrow Gauge, and explore the history of Cripple Creek and its sister city of Victor. Not only will we explore the curious human history of this area, but we will also dive into the curious natural history as well with our visit to the Florissant Fossil Beds National Monument. Once described as more dense than the Petrified Forest National Park, this gem sends us back 30 million years to a time when Colorado was covered in Giant Sequoia trees. From curious human history to curious natural history, we will experience all that makes Cripple Creek one of the most unique Colorado mountain towns.

Day One

From the History Colorado Center, we will enjoy a later morning departure via deluxe motorcoach. While Cripple Creek is not very far, we still want to travel in style! Our first stop will be Colorado Springs for lunch in the dynamic and ever-evolving downtown area. From there, we will climb U.S. Highway 24 into the mountains up Manitou Canyon, tracing the old route of the Colorado Midland Railroad, whose tunnels will be visible off to the left as we travel westward. We will flirt with Pikes Peak for much of this drive to Cripple Creek. But the towering mountain soon vanishes behind pine forests as we approach the town of Cripple Creek. Like Central City and Blackhawk, the former mining town of Cripple Creek has been transformed into a gaming town. We will be staying at the Chaminox Casino and Hotel, the newest hotel in town! We will enjoy modern accommodations, which include a Swedish-style sauna and steam room, and a rooftop heated pool, so be sure to pack a swimsuit! After we check in, we will enjoy our first group dinner. Leave your credit cards, bring your IDs, and come hungry! The adventure is just beginning.

Day Two

This day will be all about exploring what makes Cripple Creek curious. From its transition from a town of 50,000 people to a ghost town and a gaming mecca, its history is unique. Our day will begin after breakfast with a train ride on the Cripple Creek and Victor Narrow Gauge Railroad. This special two-foot gauge railroad traces the legacy lines that helped shape Cripple Creek and its sister town of Victor. After we see the landscapes dotted with the ghosts of the past from our diminutive but dynamic steam-pulled train, you will have the opportunity to get lunch on your own along the undulating main street. Once back together, we will take a jaunt over to Victor to experience a truly atypical Colorado town. There will be several options to walk around the town together, from easy walks to more challenging climbs. There will also be opportunities to shop around, so there will be something for everyone! Our afternoon will conclude with an optional walk up from our hotel to a little bar located in the former town hospital. This cozy and comfy bar will be the perfect, curious wrap-up to a day of exploring. Afterwards, freshen up at the hotel for our last group dinner. This will be at the steakhouse of the casino, so it will present the opportunity to dress up! Business casual is the flair, but don't feel like you need to stop there! After dinner, enjoy the views from the pool or cozy up in your room for a good night's rest.

Day Three

After breakfast, we will all need to check out and load our bags onto the bus. Cripple Creek has treated us so well, and we bid it farewell as our travels continue! We will head slightly Northwest as we return to History Colorado. This will allow us to explore the area's curious natural history as well! We will stop at the Florissant Fossil Beds National Monument. This extraordinary gem holds the best collection of 30-million-year-old fossils in the world. During that time, 30 million years ago, Colorado was covered in Giant Sequoia. Igneous activity sparked massive mud flows from nearby volcanoes, encasing the giant trees and petrifying their stumps. We will have the opportunity to walk among these impactful and imposing tree stumps. Around the visitor center, there are easy, short, paved trails. And for the adventurers, we will take a walk in the park to view the largest tree stumps. No matter how you spend your time here, you will be blown away by the curiosities of the natural world. A morning of playing outside certainly warrants a hearty meal. Our last stop will be in Manitou Springs for lunch and shopping before we return to Denver. No matter where we go in Colorado, it presents us an eclectic history; one filled with both curiosities and wonders from the recent to the deep, distant past.

Day One

We will depart Denver in our deluxe motorcoach and head towards the scenic San Luis Valley and History Colorado’s site there, the Fort Garland Museum and Cultural Center. After lunch on your own, we will have a guided tour of Fort Garland, including the chance to view indoor and outdoor installations from the *Unearthing Futures* exhibition that will be hosted at the Fort. Following our tour, we will continue along our route to Taos. The northern New Mexico town is known for its beautiful high desert landscape, historic adobe construction, and as a hub for generations of artists. We’ll check into our boutique hotel and enjoy our Welcome Dinner at the fine dining establishment on the premises. After a long day of travel, it will be a delight to sink into our beds and rest up for what tomorrow will bring!

Day Two

We’ll power up for another day of art and adobe and “adobe-art” with the hotel’s included breakfast. We will then make our way to the Harwood Museum of Art, where we will receive a guided experience of [Unearthing Futures/Desenterrando Futuros](#)’ main exhibition. We’ll also see some traditional historic adobe on a visit to San Francisco de Asis Church. Freshly inspired, we’ll enjoy a group lunch together before our next adventure. Our coach will deliver us to nearby Abiquiú, where we’ll get a marvelous tour of Georgia O’Keeffe’s home and studio. We’ll return to Taos, and you’ll have the afternoon and evening free to explore and have dinner on your own. Maybe you will choose to take a dip in the heated pool at our hotel before retiring for the night.

For additional assistance, call 303-866-2394 to register for tours over the phone with a credit or debit card. Note: The credit card will be immediately charged.

Day tours require payment in full at the time of booking.

Overnight tours require a refundable deposit at the time of booking to hold your spot. The balance is due by the tour registration deadline. Registration deadlines are specific to each tour and indicated in the tour description.

Pricing for overnight tours is available for double occupancy (two people per hotel room) and single occupancy (one person per room). Roommates may be requested but are not guaranteed. If paired with a roommate, you will be notified and given information to get in touch prior to the tour. If paired with a roommate who cancels after the registration deadline, you will not be charged the single occupancy rate.

To request a roommate, select a single occupancy ticket online and check the “roommate requested” box during checkout. Should you be paired with a roommate, your remaining balance will be adjusted.

Payments must be made by credit or debit card. History Colorado accepts all major credit cards.

Reservations for overnight tours are non-transferable.

Cancellation Policy

You may cancel a walking tour seven (7) or more days prior to the tour and receive a full refund or credit. Cancellations with fewer than seven days’ notice are non-refundable.

You may cancel a bus tour (day tour) fifteen (15) or more days prior to the tour and receive a full refund or credit. Cancellations with fewer than fifteen days’ notice are non-refundable.

You may cancel an overnight tour without penalty before the registration deadline posted for each tour. Any payments taken before the registration deadline will be refunded in full. Cancellations after the registration deadline are non-refundable.

If History Colorado must cancel a tour or trek, all ticket holders will be notified via email and will be fully refunded. If a tour or trek is postponed, guests will be given the option to either keep their ticket for the rescheduled date or receive a full refund.
